It also aims to provide free services such as haircuts, sports activities, pet therapy, crafts, childminding and many more.

Last Saturday, the volunteers prepared the meal at the CMCC kitchen in the morning. The kitchen was filled with family, friends and lots of smiles! The meals consisted of chicken, pasta, soup, salad, cookies, cupcakes, and fresh fruits, as well as, bread and pastries which were donated by **COBS Bread**. The volunteers loaded up The Giving Truck with the food and



materials, and off we went to Vancouver. The dinner was served behind the table and we got the opportunity to share a meal with the people in the Downtown Eastside. Sharing a meal does more than feed each per-
